Introducing Myself: Part 1

Shanna Tova! It was lovely to start 5784 with you, to worship with you, and to spend time with you on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur!

Since it is the beginning of our new relationship with each other, I'm going to spend the next few bulletin articles introducing myself through a few important lessons that I've learned along the way. I had intended to introduce myself this way during my Rosh Hashanah talk, and I'm happy to do this now.

Lesson 1: My Relationship With God

As a child going to Orthodox yeshiva day school, we prayed every day, multiple times a day: we prayed the morning service first-thing when we got to school; we prayed before and after eating snacks and lunch; and we prayed the afternoon service.

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We also learned about the miracles that God did for the Israelites and how God communicated with the Prophets, and how God wants to behave today. References to God were part of our everyday life. But "that" God was either distant and punishing or ready to "listen" to prayers and give us what we asked for *if* we were good enough. I didn't have much of a relationship with that version of God.

I graduated from yeshiva day school at the end of 8th grade and went to public high school along with supplemental Hebrew high a few hours a week.

In high school, for some reason I can't remember now, I made a promise to God to keep kosher even "out." (Our family kept kosher in our house, but we ate anything we wanted when we went to restaurants.). The following week, my friends and I went to a Chinese restaurant where I ate spare-ribs. A day or so later, I came down with a terrible cold. I thought, "yup. I made a promise and now God is punishing me." When I was well again, I talked to my Hebrew high school teacher (who was also a rabbinical student) and told him that God punished me for not keeping kosher. My teacher told me that God doesn't work like that: God doesn't punish people. He said that I got a cold because I got a cold, not because I ate spare-ribs.

It had never occurred to me that different people had different ideas about what God does and does not do!

In Hebrew high school we had to read the book When Bad Things Happen to Good People by Rabbi Harold Kushner. The main point of the book was that bad things happen sometimes because that's how nature works, or because people have free choice and sometimes make terrible decisions. God is there to walk with us and to even carry us through the hard (and good) (and neutral) times, not to keep the bad things from happening in the first place. Rabbi Kushner tells a version of this story:

A person died and was viewing her life as a timeline inscribed in the sand on the beach. During most of the event in her life, she saw two sets of side-by-side footprints – her's and God's.

But some events were missing that second set of footprints – the especially hard times, the times of great difficulties with family members and friends, the times of illness, the times of hardship – the times when she was most sad or distraught.

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This bothered her and she questioned God about it. "God, I thought you would have been with me all the time! But I see that during the most difficult times in my life, there is only one set of footprints. How could You leave me when I needed You most?"

God replied, "I love you and would never leave you. During those hard times, I was carrying you."

Recently I was studying the *Ahavah Rabbah* prayer, which is part of our morning service. It's the one that comes right after the Call To Prayer. It says:

... Be gracious to us and instruct us. ... open our hearts so that we may understand and, with love, discern, hear, and study, observe, perform, and fulfill all the teachings of your Torah with love. Enlighten our eyes with Your Torah; attach our hearts to your mitzvot...

This prayer is about love. We don't *need* to learn Torah or perform commandments because otherwise God will punish us! We *want* to learn Torah and perform mitzvot because that helps to deepen our relationship with God.

When you are in a relationship, you want to know everything you can about the other person. You want to learn their "torah", their personal teachings, their stories (just like I want to learn about you!). And you want to do what will make them happy. As my teacher, Rabbi Mickey Rosen, of blessed memory, used to say, "If you know your sweetheart prefers flowers on her birthday over candy, why would you ever buy her candy!?" It's not like she'll leave you just for giving her candy, but in getting her flowers, she'll feel, deep down inside, that you are paying attention and care about her. It's that way with the mitzvot. God will always love me, but if I can do what God wants me to do, then why wouldn't I do it? It keeps a certain openness flowing between us.

So now, I believe that God is there, walking beside me, listening to me rejoice and complain and cry, holding me when times are really tough. God wants to be in a relationship with me. God won't punish me for being "bad," and God will love and accompany each of us, even when we are not at our best.


Our congregation played a critical role in the Soviet Jewry Movement. What started here became a national movement, and let to the repatriation of Soviet Jews to the United States.
