Jewish time and the Omer

I love "Jewish time!" On the Jewish calendar, every single month, except one, has at least one holiday or observance. We don't take time for granted. We have to always be paying attention to the passage of time, to know what day it is, so that we can observe it properly. This is different from the secular calendar. On the secular calendar, months come and go – some with no holidays at all. On the Jewish calendar, daily life is interspersed with spirituality and tradition.

BUT. This intersection of spirituality and tradition with mundane, everyday life can only happen if we are aware of what day it is. I often describe Judaism as a "mindfulness practice: - we have to pay attention to the rhythm of time, or we don't get to benefit from the richness of the different qualities of time.

Right now, we are in a heightened period of time – the time between Passover and the festival of Shavuot is called The Omer. During these 49 days, we count. The best time to count the day is in the evening, at the beginning of the next Jewish day.

On Passover we celebrated when God took us out of slavery in Egypt. On Shavuot, we will celebrate when God gave us the Torah at Mount Sinai. The sages of our tradition teach us that on Passover, God became betrothed to us, the people. On Shavuot, God married us – the Torah is our ketubah, our marriage contract.

Kabbalistic masters overlaid the Omer with even more significance. Each week of the 7 weeks, are assigned one of seven qualities associated with an aspect of Godliness. Each day of the week is also assigned one of those same seven qualities. Every day during each of the seven weeks, we are given an opportunity to meditate upon the specific quality of that week, until we have cycled through the seven days of the week and the seven weeks of the Omer. By the time we arrive at Shavuot, we are well ready to receive the Torah, to know God deeply and to live in community with others in God's presence.

I invite you check out these resources for counting The Omer and for guidance along the spiritual path of the process of The Omer:

There is an Omer counting app, called "Omer Counter" by David Cooper for the ipod/iphone/ipad and for android. It is free and downloadable at the iTunes store or the Google play store.

A fun site is <http://homercalendar.net> This site goes through the daily count with Homer Simpson as our guide. There is not a lot of association with the spiritual qualities of the day, but Homer Simpson is kind of fun.

The week-by-week qualities assigned to each week are:

Week 1 (April 24 – April 30): *Hesed* = Lovingkindness, Benevolence

Week 2 (May 1 – May 7): *Gevurah* = Power, Justice, Discipline, Restraint, Awe

Week 3 (May 8 – May 14): *Tiferet* = Beauty, Harmony, Truth, Compassion

Week 4 (May 15 – May 21): *Netzach* = Endurance, Triumph, Fortitude, Ambition

Week 5 (May 22 – May 28): *Hod* = Splendor, Humility

Week 6 (May 29 – June 4): *Yesod* = Foundation, Creativity, Bonding

Week 7 (June 5 – June 10): *Malchut* = Nobility, Sovereignty, Leadership

On each night of these weeks, ask yourself how you embody the quality associated with that week. Ask yourself how that quality strengthens you and makes you a better person. Ask yourself how you can use that quality to improve your relationship with others.

By the time you get to the 50th day, June 11, we will be at the first day of Shavuot, ready to stand at Mount Sinai to receive the Torah and to stand before God.

By the way, there is a tradition to stay up at night on June 11 in preparation for receiving the Torah at Mount Sinai. I will be teaching from 11:20 pm - 12:20 am at the community-wide Layl Tikkun Shavuot, the night of study, at B'nai Jeshurun in Pepper Pike. My workshop will explore the holiness of interfaith relationships and is called "Ruth, Boaz, Interfaith Relationships, and Us." I hope that you will join me. There will be lots of teachers, lots of food, and lots of opportunities to connect with Jewish people from all over the greater Cleveland area.

NEW KITCHEN GUIDELINES FOR CLEANLINESS & ORGANIZATION

When you eat here or use our kitchen, please follow these guidelines every time. This is necessary!!!

1) For food items and beverages brought to Temple for Shabbat pot lucks, Kiddush luncheons, Onegs, dinners, Religious School functions or treats, special events such as Bar/Bat Mitzvah lunches, please refer to these guidelines:

--Take home your leftovers, give them to someone (small take home containers are in the storage room), or throw away in the garbage. Do not put things in the refrigerators thinking that someone will eat or use them. More than likely they will expire or spoil before ever being used. Toss beverages that have a very small amount left.

If some food is needed in the fridge for a certain event in the next several days, please clearly mark and date it.

--Items put in the freezer such as challahs, bagels, or pastry should be put into a zip lock bag. Freezer food items quickly get "freezer burn" and lose their freshness. **Keep the freezer organized.**

2) Cleanup after an event:

--Please wash bowls, platters, utensils, DRY THEM, and put them back in the proper location. Do not leave them in the dish rack to dry, and leave for the next person.

--Do not "donate" your older bowls, trays, casserole dishes to the Temple. Please take them home--we have newer updated serving dishes, or we will purchase more as needed.

--Please take a moment to wipe down the counters with a detergent cleaner to remove grease and crumbs, and check if any crumbs or icky, sticky stuff needs to be wiped down in the fridges. Wipe the handles.

3) Kitchen Counters & Ovens

--Avoid food or unnecessary items on the kitchen counters. Counter space is at a premium, and some items can be kept in a cupboard.

--Wipe any food, grease, or dirty areas from the oven after use. Even a light wipe down is beneficial!

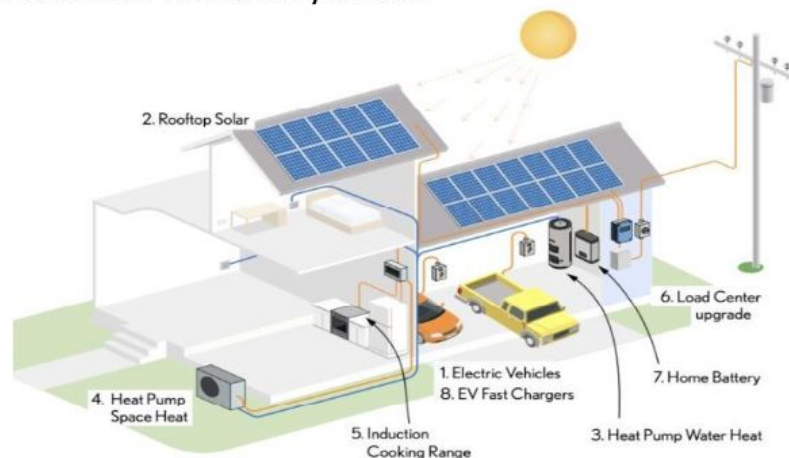

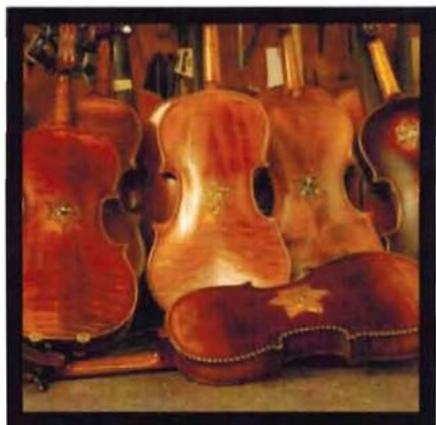

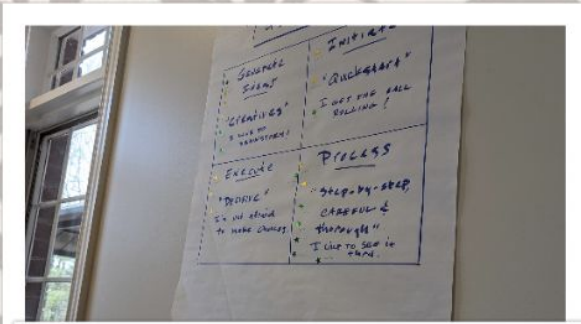
