My column this month is a condensed version of the talk I shared on Rosh Hashanah:

A Better Draft - Rabbi Rachel Brown

Rosh Hashanah is called *Hayom harat olam* – the birthday of the world. Birthdays aren't about the past; they're about the future, about possibility.

The Torah begins with creation: light separated from darkness, the first day unfolding. Our mystics taught that God created more than one draft before this world. Early versions collapsed, or left no space for anything but God. Finally, God chose to practice tzimtzum - stepping back, leaving room for imperfection, struggle, and human freedom. Creation, by design, is unfinished.

That resonates with me as a parent. I often want to fix things for my son, to do them quickly and correctly. But if he's going to learn, I have to step back, let him try, even let him fail. That's *tzimtzum*. That's what God did for us.

But sometimes this unfinished world feels unbearable: violence between Israelis and Palestinians, rising antisemitism here at home, and our country divided and fraying. Members of our own community tell me they hesitate to wear a kippah in public. Headlines tighten our chests, lock our shoulders. At times, this world feels like a failed draft.

But the Hasidic masters remind us: maybe that's the point. Each of us is born with a *hisaron* – a gap, an emptiness, a lesson to learn. Life itself is a series of drafts. We stumble, we forget, we hurt each other. And each year, Rosh Hashanah invites us to begin again. To write another draft.

I think of Maoz Inon, an Israeli peace activist whose parents were murdered in the Hamas attack of October 7, 2023. He could have chosen rage or revenge. Instead, he speaks of peace and reconciliation, insisting no child – Israeli or Palestinian – should endure what he has endured. His grief could have consumed him; instead, he is writing a better draft.

What might a better draft look like for us this year? A better draft of politics that remembers policies affect families. A better draft of our communities, where we protect children instead of burying them. A better draft of ourselves – speaking more gently, forgiving more quickly, remembering that every person is made in God's image.

Creation is unfinished because God left it that way – waiting for us to take up the work. This Rosh Hashanah, may we write a better draft: one of compassion, courage, and healing. May Israel and Gaza find a way to choose life. May our country rediscover its soul. And may each of us, in our own lives, begin again.

President's Desk



Hello Friends. Shanah Tovah to all of you. We have welcomed in the New Year of 5786 and are looking forward to Kol Nidrei and Yom Kippur (which may have happened by the time you read this). The time between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur is called *Yamim Nora'im*, the Days of Awe, and they are a time for everyone to think about the past year. They are a time to reflect on our actions and to reflect on what we could have done differently, and maybe better. In many cases, this is an individual self-reflection. I'd like to offer a Beth Israel self-reflection.

On the whole, this was a wonderful year for Beth Israel.

- Our Religious School is thriving, our children are learning about Jewish values and history, and they are celebrating milestone occasions with the community.
- Our building is continuing to undergo renovations shortly after Yom Kippur, the second floor will become a construction zone as we remove and replace all of the windows in the sanctuary, foyer, library, offices/classrooms along the north side of the building, behind the bimah, and by the back staircase. The sanctuary windows will take five weeks to be made and installed; the rest will be quicker. We can't wait to welcome everyone for our Chanukah celebration, to enjoy the warmth and glow of the sanctuary.
- We switched mahzorim for the High Holy Days and had a terrific response to our book dedication fundraiser – thank you to everyone who contributed and has dedicated a set of prayerbooks to loved ones.
- We continue to offer programming for adults, sharing our knowledge and skills with one another.

But there are challenges.

- As are most non-profit organizations, Beth Israel is facing financial hurdles.
 The Board is having conversations about how to address them but know that
 every contribution you make is critical towards enabling us to offer quality
 programming for our youth and adults.
- Our membership is shrinking. It's not a huge decline, but it's a decline. And
 given that we have financial hurdles to overcome, every member family that
 leaves hurts. So if you hear of new families moving to the area, please
 encourage them to visit us. We can offer them a tour of the building and speak
 with them about our programming. I've already seen the fruits of these labors
 with several new families at Sunday School.

As I reflect back on my first 15 months as President of Beth Israel, we have accomplished great things. But I know that we can do more. We're a volunteer run organization – if you are interested in helping keep Beth Israel strong and vibrant and present, please let me know. We will use your skills to grow this amazing community.




